Civil Air Patrol: Origin

1 December 1941

Minutemen of World War II

- Coastal Patrol:

Flew half a million hours/24 million miles

Found 173 German subs; attacked 57; destroyed two

- Target towing
- Courier service
- Liaison cargo flights
- Air search and rescue

64 lives lost






CAP HISTORY

- 1 Dec 1941 - Established Under Office of Civilian Defense
- 1943 - Transferred to War Department
- 1946 - Incorporated (PL 476)
- 1948 - Auxiliary of USAF (PL 557)
 - 1st **Board Chairman Gen "Tooney" Spaatz**
- **1950 - CAP Chaplain Program Organized**
 - Air Force Chief of Chaplains asked to assign a senior chaplain to CAP.



CAP REGIONAL STRUCTURE









USAF CONUS Bases











Statement of Work

Statement between USAF & CAP

"The CAP chaplain service should be modeled after the Air Force Chaplain Service. CAP chaplains should meet equivalent educational standards as Air Force chaplains and should obtain ecclesiastical endorsement/approval from a religious official approved by the DoD Armed Forces Board."

New Law in Effect

- The Floyd D. Spence National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2001

Title 10 USC, Chapter 909, Section 9446a

"USE OF CIVIL AIR PATROL CHAPLAIN—

The Secretary of the Air Force may use the services of Civil Air Patrol chaplains in support of Air Force **active duty and **reserve component** forces to the extent and under conditions that the Secretary determines appropriate."**
